

Statement to members on the economic crisis and education

from ASTI President, Joe Moran and General Secretary, John White

Unprecedented Difficulties Ahead

Ireland, the education service, and teachers face unprecedented challenges over the coming months. Never before have we faced cutbacks of the depth and extent proposed for Budget 2010.

Everybody recognises that Ireland is faced with the worst economic crisis for at least 80 years created by the hubris of a rampant, poorly regulated capitalism.

Unemployment is likely to reach 15.5% next year and the government is borrowing €400 million per week. In this context, public service unions, including teacher unions, face unprecedented difficulties. The government is committed to reducing the deficit by €4 billion in Budget 2010. This will likely involve a combination of tax increases and cuts in expenditure, including education. Further expenditure reductions are scheduled for 2011, 2012 and 2013.

McCarthy Report

Cutbacks are proposed in all areas of the public service, e.g. in Health the proposed cuts amount to €1,229 million. The cuts proposed for second-level education amount to €114 million out of a total expenditure cut in education of €745.9 million.

The cuts proposed in second-level education are:

This total of €114 million, however, masks a further proposed saving of €100 million in the cost of supervision and substitution at primary and post-primary, and a further €50 million in management allowances at primary and post-primary. The McCarthy Report also states that the "current teacher contract appears unduly restrictive, and this means that activities such as teacher inservice development and school planning have tended to erode the school year".

A moratorium on filling vacancies has been announced for the public service. Vacancies can be filled in education but no post of responsibility vacancies can be filled which will inevitably mean an impoverishment of the education we can offer.

Unity Essential in Reaction to McCarthy Report

The ASTI believes that implementation of the proposals in the McCarthy Report would have devastating effects in the education service, which should be the avenue to the creation of the knowledge society which alone can lead us out of recession.

The four teacher unions - ASTI, TUI, INTO and IFUT - at a recent meeting decided that a co-ordinated response to the attacks on education is the only way to protect education from the most damaging cutbacks being proposed particularly in the McCarthy Report.

Taxation of Pension Lump Sums

The one piece of good news in a Summer of gloom for education is that the Commission on Taxation Report recommends that taxation of pension lump sums would be on sums of over €200,000.

No Pay Cuts

The Public Services Committee of Congress has sought commitments from the government that there will be no pay cuts, no taxation of the pension lump sum, and that security of tenure will be preserved.

Social Solidarity Pact

Given the government decision to seek to reduce the budget deficit by €4 billion in next December's budget, it is likely that any discussions on the public service including education will be the most difficult in living memory. The unions have stated to the government that a social solidarity pact is the only fair way to address the crisis.

Such a solidarity pact should ensure that those best able to bear the burden of the fiscal crisis - the well-off - should bear the greatest burden. Such a pact should also ensure a consensus is reached on the level of public services such as health and education that a decent society requires. Opportunities for our new and temporary teachers should be an absolute priority for us. All of the public service unions, including all of the teaching unions, are willing to talk to the government in that context.

Absence of Agreement

The ASTI is dedicated to ensuring that the education service comes through this unprecedented crisis capable of providing a high quality education for our pupils and that teaching will continue as a profession respected and well remunerated.

All unions will have to hold intensive internal discussions on a co-ordinated response. In that context, the ASTI is organising 18 regional meetings in order to garner information on the cutbacks in schools and to report on developments. You are invited to attend these meetings. The ASTI has issued directives to members in response to the Budget cutbacks and the moratorium on posts of responsibility:

- (a) parent-teacher meetings and staff meetings outside of school time;
- (b) school development planning meetings;
- (c) whole school evaluation and subject inspections;
- (d) posts of responsibility, and
- (e) class size.

A ballot on industrial action may be necessary. A go-it-alone policy by any group is easily picked off by the government; the example of the pharmacists is a clear case in point. Never was there a greater need for unity of purpose among members of the ASTI, among the four teachers unions and amongst the broader union movement. •

Good news on CIDs

The requirement that CIDs can only be awarded where teachers have four years continuous service in the same post has been removed so that the requirement is now four years continuous service in the same school, but not necessarily in the same post.

The ASTI had presented an argument for this change. Discussions have led to an agreement with the Department of Education and Science and management bodies that the requirement for four years continuous service "will include any period for which the teacher covered for another teacher absent on an approved scheme of leave". In other words, any or all of the first three years of the contract could be filling in for a teacher on, for example, a career break.

This does not affect ineligibility for a CID due to objective grounds set out in a previous contract. ◆

World Teachers' Day

"Build the Future: Invest in Teachers Now" is a fitting theme for this year's World Teachers' Day given that up to a 1,000 second-level teaching posts have been lost in Ireland due to the education cutbacks.

The ASTI will be participating in this international event, which aims to celebrate the work of teachers, by highlighting the damaging effects of fewer teachers to our young people's education.

In addition, the ASTI is encouraging school staff to organise, through the ASTI School Steward, to buy cakes to enjoy at morning break on World Teachers' Day - Monday, October 5th. The cost can be reclaimed from the local ASTI branch. ◆

Lecture on the history of the ASTI

The lecture will be held in the Mansion House in Dublin where, at a meeting in July 1909, the Association of Secondary Teachers, Ireland was officially founded. ◆
