

General Election – Questions for Politicians

The upcoming General Election provides an opportunity for teachers to act together in delivering a message to politicians and political parties.

During the past two years, the ASTI has campaigned - alongside our colleagues in other trade unions - for a better, fairer way which involves prioritising people and protecting our public services. A consistent message from the ASTI has been that education must be protected because it is essential for economic recovery.

Political parties are launching manifestos and politicians are knocking on doors. It is vital that as many ASTI members as possible engage with politicians and parties prior to election day on February 25th. This will help to deliver the message that people and public services must be prioritised by any incoming Government.

Tell your politicians ...

Please tell all canvassers/ candidates how you, your family and your school have been affected by the current situation including public sector pay cuts, job losses and cuts to education services. Remember, while statistics can be useful, it is real life stories and experiences which will help to change thinking.

Questions for politicians:

- ◆ Will you honour the terms of the Croke Park Agreement (including no compulsory redundancies and no further pay cuts)?
- ◆ Will you protect second-level schools from further cuts?
- ◆ Will you oppose the proposed new public service pension scheme which will see new teachers pay more into their pension than they will receive in benefit?
- ◆ Will you seek to restore the salaries of new teachers so that they are in line with their teacher colleagues?
- ◆ Will you prioritise job creation?
